Tournament and Gillespie Field Information

There will be an awards presentation after the championship game with a team award and individual champion t-shirts presented to the championship team.

All entrance to the 2010 Landmark Conference Championships must be made through the main gate located behind the grandstand off of Center Street. Admission prices are set by the Landmark Conference. Those who enter and want to leave, re-entry will be permitted (a hand stamp will be used for re-entry). Spectators are asked to abide by the Landmark Conference sportsmanship code. No alcohol or pets will be permitted inside the stadium gates.

The concession stand is located behind the grandstand.

Small men's and women's restrooms are located at the far end of the building located at the end of the parking lot just past our tennis courts.

The Moravian College Athletic Training staff will have a tent set up just outside the gate by our tennis courts. The athletic training facilities are open to members of all competing teams.

The teams will be taking indoor batting practice at Breidegam Fieldhouse beginning two hours prior to game time. The teams will also use the HUB Quad field to stretch and throw. Spectators are not allowed in these areas.

About Moravian College:

America's sixth-oldest college, Moravian delivers a values-based liberal arts education in a caring environment, through which it nurtures in students the capacities for leadership, lifelong learning, and positive societal contributions.

The College traces its founding to 1742 by followers of John Amos Comenius, the 17th century Moravian bishop whose humanistic ideals helped to shape modern education. Those ideals that learning should be available to all, that teaching should be in accord with human nature, and that education should be applied to practical uses, are much in evidence at Moravian. Today, the College enrolls students from a great variety of socioeconomic, religious, racial, and ethnic backgrounds; provides for highly personalized learning experiences; and offers many opportunities for students to direct their education toward individual and professional goals.

Moravian's strong curriculum is reinforced by a scholarly dedicated faculty. The Leadership Center fosters student leadership qualities and skills. Students are encouraged to collaborate with faculty on original research, pursue honors projects, independent work, internships, and field study. Moravian recently produced 7 Fulbright scholars, a Goldwater scholar, a Rhodes finalist, a Truman Scholarship finalist, and 3 NCAA postgraduate scholars.

Facilities range from historic to modern, with a \$20 million academic complex featuring current educational technology, at the heart of the Main Street Campus. The College and the Bethlehem Area Moravians completed a new residence hall on its historic Hurd Campus in 2009. The \$25 million project houses approximately 230 students; contain classrooms, and other learning spaces that support the academic and co-curricular mission of the College.

Moravian promotes the complete college student experience for mind, body, and spirit. Its robust varsity sports program, from football to tennis, has produced nationally ranked women's softball and track teams, and All-American student athletes—including several Olympic hopefuls—in many sports. Athletes compete on a state-of-the-art synthetic multi-sport Rocco Calvo Field and the Timothy Breidegam eight-lane Olympic track.

More than 90 percent of Moravian graduates are employed full time or enrolled in graduate or professional schools within six months of graduation. Moravian's intensive career-planning program, which begins in the first year, means that Moravian graduates are ready to face the future with confidence.



About the Landmark Conference:

The Landmark Conference is a Division III athletics conference, formed in December of 2005 in an effort to bring together colleges and universities from the mid-Atlantic region with similar philosophies regarding the role of athletics as part of the overall collegiate experience. On June 6, 2006 it was announced that The Catholic University of America, Drew University, Goucher College, Juniata College, Moravian College, Susquehanna University and United States Merchant Marine Academy had formed a soon-to-be-named Division III conference, with the University of Scranton becoming the eighth member in November of 2006.

The most literal inspiration for the Landmark Conference's name comes from the many well-known physical landmarks of the Mid-Atlantic region encompassed by the conference. The name also reflects the significance of the institutions' decision to align themselves with other colleges and universities of similar size, educational philosophies, and high academic standards. It highlights the Landmark Conference's intention to stand out not only in athletics, but also in academics, emphasizing educational achievement and the important role played by athletics in the undergraduate experience.

Demonstrating the Landmark Conference's dedication to helping student-athletes balance their obligations and excel across disciplines, conference leaders have already decided to hold long-distance games only on weekends, minimizing the time student-athletes will have to spend away from class. The conference institutions boast some of the best academic reputations in the region, and the eight programs have combined to produce numerous Academic All-Americans and Academic All-District selections in recent years.

The conference sponsors championships in field hockey, men's and women's soccer, women's volleyball and men's and women's cross country in the fall, men's and women's basketball, swimming and diving and men's and women's indoor track and field during the winter and baseball, softball, men's and women's tennis, men's and women's lacrosse and men's and women's outdoor track in the spring. The Landmark features perennial national powers in nearly every sport including men's and women's soccer, women's volleyball, men's and women's basketball and will provide all student-athletes with high-level competition.

The conference's eight institutions are spread throughout the mid-Atlantic region, stretching from northern Pennsylvania and eastern New York to Washington DC in the south. The geographic diversity creates even greater opportunity for growth for the Landmark's student-athletes. When the conference began competition in the Fall of 2007 it marked a new chapter in the history of each of the eight institutions as the programs grow together in their unique athletic and academic enterprise.
