Join the Alumni Association on Monday, February 8, for the semester's first

Monday Roundtable and travel the high seas from Argentina to Antarctica with speaker, Charles Hasenecz. His slide presentation and lecture is set for 7:00 p.m. in Prosser Auditorium. It is preceded by an optional cafeteria-style dinner (\$7.00) at 6:15 p.m. in the Snyder Room.

Charles Hasenecz's roots spring from the Carpathian Mountain area, currently known as the Ukraine. His parents immigrated to America circa 1904, and he is the tenth child of thirteen children. Diligently working his way through school, Charles earned a B. A. degree from Moravian College in 1953, certification to teach English as a second language at the University of Michigan, and an M. A. from Lehigh University.

Charles taught English in the Bethlehem Area School District for almost thirty years, intermittently taking leaves of absence to teach English as a second language



in Greece, Israel and Cyprus.

Post-retirement he taught at Northampton

County Area Community College for several years. In addition to his many interests and pursuits, Charles lends a hand during the week as a volunteer for St. Luke's Hospital. He has also served for over thirty-five years as choir director for the Russian Orthodox Church in Bethlehem.

Charles having traveled to many countries, observed the validity of John Steinbeck's remark "A journey is a person in itself; no two are alike. And all plans, safeguards, policies and coercion are fruitless. We find after years of struggle that we do not take a trip; a trip takes us."

Marie Mayer, roundtable coordinator said, "Ruth and Michael Fidorack shared the excitement of the Arctic with us at a Roundtable in 1998, now along with a fellow teacher, 'let the trip take us' on a journey of discovery through the waters of the Antarctica in 1999."

Ketterman-Benner, head women's tennis coach at Moravian, has led the Lady Greyhounds to three straight Middle Atlantic Conference Championships. The 1998 squad has a current winning streak of 30. Ketterman-Benner, a graduate of East Stroudsburg University and a member of the Hall of Fame at ESU, also serves as senior women's administrator.

CIT Begins New Year with Laudable Mantra

“Last year has taught us that for CIT the most important job is to provide systems to our users that are secure, reliable, and easy to use—that’s our mantra,” said Ron Helmuth, CIT director. In keeping with that, he has redefined and supplemented the staff, building a team that will function with the flow of work created by the addition of CMDS, the new administrative software.

Ron announced that he is pleased with the reorganization and presents here the staff and what they do, so that faculty and staff are aware of the redefined jobs of long-standing staff members and the responsibilities of the new members. Most of the new positions have been announced throughout the year, except for that of Tom Mondschein, the team leader for the user support division who began in January. Tom of Northampton joins Moravian from the East Penn School District. He brings 15 years of microcomputer support in various organizations with special skills involving the network, the lab, and the MacIntosh computer.

CIT has three categories of support: administrative systems, user support, and networking. The administrative systems division is responsible for the maintaining the system, the transition to

CMDS, and its operation. The user support division is in charge of management and maintenance of the microcomputer systems and the HELP desk, and the networking division maintains the network.

Administrative systems consists of Donna Posivak, assistant director and manager of special projects, Lisa Petrine, half-time employee, IT analyst, Meredith Poindexter-Bird, operations half time, Paul Edinger, IT analyst, Kathy Benner, CMDS technician half time and office manager half time. Also, a highly valued though not permanent staff member of this section is Lou Feigh (half-time temp) who works with the Open 36, serves as a generalist and programmer.

Those in user support include Tom, team leader, Steve Schrack, user services coordinator, and Meredith, Help Desk technician half time.

The networking section includes Jim Beers, network engineer and networking team leader, Maria Lucas, network administrator, and MoCoSIN administrator, Myron Kowalski.

“This is an effective way to organize,” Ron said. CMDS is taking a lot of our effort. We will divert more help to user support when CMDS is fully converted.

What Makes News? Follow These Guidelines to Success

The Office of Public Relations is always on the lookout for news about Moravian College to provide the media. Michael Wilson, director of public relations, urges everyone to think about what's happening in their lives relevant to Moravian and submit ideas. He suggests that these points be kept in mind when deciding what to publicize.

The media is in the business of providing news and entertainment that is of the greatest interest to its readers, viewers, and listeners. The media strives to attract the largest audience for its products in order to sell advertising space. Newspa-

per editors, television and radio news directors, and assignment editors must decide which stories to cover from the many news releases and leads they receive each day. The cardinal rule in news coverage is that the story must be interesting to the audience.

Elements of News: The following criteria provide a general litmus test for whether a story is likely to be interesting to the media. Please consider these points when planning to publicize an event:

Timeliness: The media has the greatest interest in significant

events that just happened or are about to take place.

Proximity: People and events in or near the Lehigh Valley have an increased likelihood of being covered.

Consequence: The event or story should be important to the audience, or affect/influence them in some way.

Prominence: The people, places or events should be well-known or have significant stature.

Oddity: Stories that contain unusual elements or are significant milestones such as the first, the last, the most, are more likely to be interesting.

Conflict: The media is always interested in controversy.

Progress: Stories that highlight advances, accomplishments, promotions, renovations, expansions, growth and change are noteworthy.

Drama: Human interest stories that are colorful and contain a sense of poignancy, tragedy, or optimism get attention.

Public: Events that are open to the public and are appealing to a large audience have a greater chance of being covered.

John Byrne Named Executive Director of Blue & Grey Club, Assistant Director of Athletics



John Byrne, head softball coach for the Lady Greyhounds, has had

assistant to the director of athletics and executive director of the Blue & Grey Club added to his duties, Dick Dull, director of athletics, announced recently.

As part of his new responsibilities, John will be in charge of fundraising for the athletic department through Moravian's booster club, the Blue & Grey Club. He will develop and implement a strategic plan for achieving Moravian's fund raising goals for short term and long term needs. He will also be in charge of expanding the membership of the Blue & Grey Club as well as identifying prospective donors. John will assist in the management of all fund raising activities including the golf tournaments

and Hall of Fame dinner.

John has been head softball coach at Moravian for the past five years and has led the Lady Greyhounds to a 140-53 record, three Middle Atlantic Conference playoff appearances, two MAC Commonwealth League titles and a berth in the 1998 NCAA Division III National Championships.

A 1982 graduate of Moravian with a bachelor of arts degree in political science and a minor in management, John served as athletic recruiting coordinator from 1985 to 1998. John started four years for the Greyhound baseball squad, was assistant baseball coach from 1983 to 1992 and was the Lady Greyhound volleyball coach in 1988, leading the team to a then school record 25 victories. He also works as an associate scout for the Cincinnati Reds Organization.

Outside Scholarships Available to Students

AAUW

The Allentown Branch of the American Association of University Women (AAUW) is offering scholarships to women residing in Lehigh County. Scholarships are limited to those whose studies have been interrupted for at least six months. Grants will be at least \$500 each. *The application deadline is March 1, 1999.*

AAUW

The Bethlehem Branch of the American Association of University Women is awarding scholarships to local, nontraditional women students who have had their studies interrupted at some point for at least six months. Applicants must have completed the equivalent of two years of college work and must be attending or have been accepted for the fall term at an accredited four-year college for undergraduate work. The scholarship is awarded based on financial need, academic record and demonstrated promise of academic success. *The application deadline is March 10, 1999.*

American Institute of Certified Public Accountants

The American Institute of Certified Public Accountants is sponsoring scholarships for minority accounting students. These are competitive merit and need-based awards of up to \$5000 for full-time undergraduate and graduate students. Undergraduates must have and over all and accounting GPA of at least 3.0. *The application deadline is July 1, 1999.*

The American Water Works Association

The American Water Works Association is offering two \$1500 scholarships to encourage study in fields relating to the water supply

industry. Students eligible to apply must be second semester juniors, seniors or graduate students and must be pursuing a degree in engineering biology, chemistry, business administration or other field which may lead to a career in the water supply industry. *The application deadline is March 1, 1999.*

Episcopal Church Diocese of Pennsylvania

The Diocese of Pennsylvania is sponsoring scholarships to assist women training for religious or benevolent work pertaining to the Episcopal Church. Eligible applicants must have earned a bachelor's degree and must be accepted into a seminary program or an advanced degree program in the helping professions, such as education, social work, religion or medicine. *Deadline for applications is March 15, 1999.*

The John Gyles Education Fund

The John Gyles Education Fund is offering financial assistance to students in all areas of post-secondary study. A minimum

GPA of 2.70 is required. Selected students will receive up to \$3000. *Deadlines for 1999 are April 1, June 1, and November 15.*

Information Systems Audit & Control Association

The Philadelphia chapter of the Information Systems Audit & Control Association is offering awards for contributing to the information systems auditing profession. The awards include a scholarship, a research grant, and a best paper contest. *Applications, grant proposals, and papers are due by April 1, 1999.*

National Society of Public Accounts Scholarship Foundation

The National Society of Public Accounts Scholarship Foundation is sponsoring awards for deserving undergraduate accounting students. Students may apply for a scholarship for their second, third or fourth year of studies. Eligible candidates must be enrolled full-time pursuing an accounting degree with a 3.00 GPA or better.

Dynamic Leader, Active Task Force Members, Study Student Development

The Student Development Task Force is at the core of the Commission on the Future because the student is at the center of education, according to task force chair Connie Stirling Hodson '68. The Student Development Task Force, now 41 strong, is composed of trustees, alumni, business and community leaders, and faculty and staff. It is the third of six Commission task forces being highlighted in the *Bulletin* throughout the year as they examine the goals and initiatives of the College and Seminary.

Bob Schoenen, chair of the commission, said, "Under Connie's dynamic leadership this task force is moving in a direction where it appears that student development will be thoroughly studied and concrete ideas will be found to solve some of the challenges that the College faces in making the collegiate experience more meaningful for our students.

Connie, who has a B.S. in education and serves as a fundraiser for the University of Chicago Children's Hospital, has been on Moravian's Alumni Association Board of Directors for the past four years, the last two as president and a member of the Board of Trustees. She was challenged then to see if someone from afar (Illinois) could adequately serve the Moravian College community and she met that challenge with considerable success. She continues to be on the alumni board and has now met yet another challenge, this time from President Rokke, who asked her to chair the Student Development task force. She said, "How can you turn down Erv Rokke? Here I am." She added, "The

faculty has been wonderful in supporting me and helping in the committee structure."

Connie explained the Student Development Task Force approach. "Our task force agreed that we must use a holistic view of the student, linking curriculum with co-curriculum. There are many dimensions to learning. Our final recommendations to Moravian for the best education will interconnect the intellectual with social, emotional, spiritual, and physical development."

She added, "The task force is made up of many talented alumni and community leaders who are lending their expertise to strategize for the future of Moravian College. We agreed that we want Moravian to continue to be a very special place. The opportunity to have a say in the future of Moravian is exciting. We want to make a difference."

The Student Development Task Force is examining two important questions: Who are the Moravian students of today and what would be the profile of an ideal graduate?

In addressing the first question, Connie said the task force felt it crucial to understand the students in order to determine their needs realistically. In preparation, the group read parts of *When Hope and Fear Collide* by Levine and

Cureton, and *The Abandoned Generation* by Willimon and Naylor. They compiled two lists to define the answers to their questions and discussed the challenges of going from the first to the second. They addressed questions such as: How can we best prepare students for life? or how can they balance freedom with responsibility?

The Student Development Task Force revisited the goals and the initiatives already developed by the College and formed breakout groups to concentrate on three specific initiatives—character, mentorship, and transitions. (Faculty or staff members providing guidance and assistance are shown below for each subgroup.)

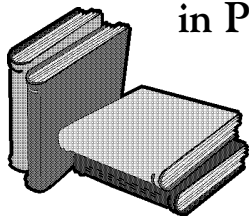
The Character subgroup is studying core values, honor codes, interdisciplinary concepts such as leadership and character development, values transmission and citizenship preparation. (Bob Brill of the Psychology Department.)

The Mentorship subgroup is defining and evaluating mentors and advisors. Mentoring involves faculty, alumni, and peers. Students need good role models and colleges need to bring the students together with the faculty. (Carmen Ferrero-Pino of the Foreign Languages Department and April Vari, associate dean of students.)

The Transitions subgroup is looking at dealing with change throughout college and into the working world or graduate school. The team is researching how to teach transition problem solving through a freshman course and a senior seminar. (George Brower of the Economics and Business Department and Bridget Haines, assistant dean of residence life.)

Moravian People in Print



Dan Gilbert, professor of history emeritus and College archivist, had five biographical sketches published in the new *American National Biography* series. This publication is designed to take the place of the old *Dictionary of American Biography* (the DAB) for which Dan also contributed several articles.

These latest sketches are all of former major figures in American sport and include such men as the late Ernie Davis, the first African-American to win the Heisman Trophy, and the famous University of Tennessee football coach (a protégé of General Douglas MacArthur), General Robert Neyland, Jr. "Anyone watching that Tennessee-Florida State football game for the Division I national title, heard Neyland mentioned over and again as the one who began the modern football tradition at Tennessee," Dan said.

Dan has published similar sketches in various biographical dictionaries on other sport heroes and an article on the famous historian at the University of Pennsylvania, Edward Potts Cheyney.

The essay on General Neyland, the longest of Dan's essays in this most recent series, was researched down in the general's old stomping grounds at the University of Tennessee in Knoxville. Dan's trip down there to do the research was supported by money from the College's Faculty Development and Research Committee.

Chapman presents at Society of Christian Ethics meeting . . . Clarke Chapman attended the annual meeting of the Society of Christian Ethics, January 8-10, in San Francisco. There he presented a paper, "Bonhoeffer's Liberation Ethics?" which received lively discussion. Other subjects addressed at the meeting included what Jewish and Christian Ethicists have to say to one another; "Just Peacemaking," a series of ten trends and practices that reduce the threat of war in coming decades; and a panel discussing the distinctions of public and private morality in light of the current crisis of the Clinton presidency. Included on that panel was Phillip

Wogaman, presently pastor in Washington, D.C., to the Clinton family and formerly the president of the Society of Christian Ethics.

Morton presents at Phonathon Conference . . . assistant director of annual giving, Kim Morton, accompanied by senior student phonathon manager, Gina Stano attended the first Delaware Valley Phonathon Managers Conference on January 7. Morton presented Moravian College's unique student run phonathon program in a presentation titled "Balancing Phonathon with Other Tasks." They have a borrowing period of one day but this is negotiable."

Finally, the library has set up a PC workstation for wheelchair bound students. This workstation is on the main level, south end (near Janet Sipple's office.) The workstation is located on the adjustable carrel that was purchased from the proceeds of the Antique Show and is available *only* for the wheelchair bound. This PC has network access to library resources, word processing, e-mail and the campus network resources.

NCAA

The NCAA is sponsoring postgraduate scholarships for minorities and women for careers in athletics. Focus is on careers in coaching, athletics administration and officiating. The NCAA Women's Enhancement Program and the NCAA Minority Enhancement Program each awards a number of scholarships of \$6000 for one year of postgraduate study to women and ethnic minorities, respectively. Eligible applicants of either group must be entering their first semester of postgraduate studies, seeking admission or accepted into an NCAA member institution's sports administration program or related program that will assist in obtaining a career in intercollegiate athletics. Extracurricular activities and course work, as well as commitment to pursuing a career in intercollegiate athletics will be considered. Financial need is not a factor in granting these scholarships. *The application deadline is February 12, 1999.*

Women's Overseas Service League

The Women's Overseas Service League is sponsoring a number of awards averaging \$500 to \$1000 annually. Awards are granted to women who are committed to military or other public service careers, have completed a minimum of 12 semester hours of study with a minimum GPA of 2.50 and are enrolled at least half time. *The application deadline is March 1, 1999.*

Dapp Named to AFCA Board of Trustees

Moravian College head football coach Scot Dapp has been elected to the Board of Trustees for the American Football Coaches Association by the members attending the 1999 AFCA Convention in Nashville, Tennessee.

Three new members on the Board, Sam Houston State head coach Ron Randleman, Northwest Missouri State head coach Mel Tjeerdsma and Wake Forest head coach Jim Caldwell, join Dapp.

Dapp, a Boyertown native, replaces outgoing trustee John Luckhardt of Washington & Jefferson College, who retired at the end of the 1998 season, as an at-large representative in Division III. Dapp has been the head coach at Moravian since 1987 and has a 12-year record of 80-42-1 (.654 winning percentage). A two-time

Pastoral Care and Spirituality: February 5

Two psychology and spirituality lectures will be held on February 19 in the Bahnson Center featuring William Arnold. The registration deadline with the Seminary's Office of Continuing Education is February 5. Jane Burcaw, assistant to the director of continuing education, will only accept registrants after that date if space permits.

The first, "Pastoral Care and Spirituality: A Journey through the Recent Past," will be at 9:30 a.m. and traces the history of pastoral care and counseling over the last 35 years. Discussion will focus on the various influences on pastoral care, both psychological and theological, that have attempted to rule the field.

The second, at 10:45 a.m., "Pastoral Care and Spirituality: Some Proposals for Raising the 'Spiritual Ante,'" will pursue the similarities of care and direction through exploring highlights from the first lecture.

Arnold is an ordained Presbyterian minister and received his Ph.D. in religion and pastoral counseling from Southern Baptist Seminary. He authored several books and publications, including *When Your Parents Divorce*, *Introduction to Pastoral Care*, and *Pastoral Responses to Sexual Issues*.

Spirituality Course

A five-week course, The Johannine Style of Spirituality will be held in the Bahnson Center beginning Thursday, February 4. The course, intended to support persons in their spiritual journeys and to introduce them to the resources of the Gospel of John.

The common element in each person's spiritual journey is that the journey is with Christ. The model for spirituality is persons coming to Jesus (or He to them), and they come, see, and stay with Him, discovering what He wishes them to discover. Jessie Coughlin Scores 1,000th Point

On a three-pointer with nine minutes left in the first half of a 75-59 loss to Elizabethtown College, Moravian College senior Jessie Coughlin of Bethlehem became the 12th player in Lady Greyhound history to surpass the 1,000-point plateau.

Coughlin, who entered the game needing just one point, took the three-pointer from the top of the key, which bounced off two sides of the rim before it fell through.

The two-time Middle Atlantic Conference Commonwealth League All-Star and team MVP has played in 90 games during her career with 1,017 points, 321 rebounds, 316 assists and 289 steals. Only one other player in

Moravian history, Sue Zimmerman '96, has scored 1,000 points and added 300 assists and 300 steals in a career.

Coughlin, a 5-6 guard, has led Moravian to a 9-6 record this season and a 52-38 record in four seasons.

Coughlin is also a standout tennis player at Moravian. She completed her career this past fall with the best winning percentage in school history, .969, on a 62-2 record in second singles. The Lady Greyhound tennis team captured the MAC title the last three years and has a 30-match winning streak entering 1999.
