## Moravian College Dancers Stage 24th Annual Concert

Student- and professional-choreographed works highlight the Moravian College Dancers' 24th Annual Concert scheduled for Friday and Saturday, March 26 and 27, at 8:00 p.m. in Foy Concert Hall. The exciting lineup of performances swings from hiphop/techno and modern dance through tap, jazz, and ballet.

The dance company has five talented and experienced student choreographers this year: Sara deMange '99, a psychology/elementary education major, Alex Dimopoulos '99, a psychology major, Cecilia Loyola '99, a biology major, Kristy Rashko '99, a psychology/elementary education major, and Rebekah Worthington '00, also a psychology/elementary education major. Sara choreographed a modern dance piece "Chuckie's in Love"; Alex, a ballet piece called "Six"; and Cecilia, a hiphop/techno piece called "Take California." Kristy did a jazz

choreography to Peggy Lee's "Fever," and Rebekah choreographed a ballet/tap dance number to the music of "That Thing" by Lauren Hill.

This year the 20 dancers will perform several pieces by professional choreographers. They include Pattie Bostick, "Foot-loose"; Tim Early, "Tranquillissimo"; Lynne Jarrett, "Saturday Night Fever"; and Dawn Ketterman Benner, senior women's administrator, and chair of the Physical Education Department, "Taking Care of Business."

Return guest artists include the Coral Nolan Dance Company and the DanceGing Company, both performing pointe ballet. On Friday, Nicole Kostura's T.A.P.

Dance Company will be performing two lively tap dances, and on Saturday, Roger von Bing's Broadway Rhythm Dance Company will be performing a jazz piece from *Victor/Victoria* and a tap number. Liza Larzen '96 will entertain the audience with a lyrical modern piece to the music of Iris deMent.

There is no charge but donations are accepted at the door.

Past performances have drawn standing-room-only crowds. Dawn, faculty director, and Lynne artistic director, express confidence in the success of this year's program. Kristy agreed, "Everyone has been really dedicated in achieving an awesome concert this year."

## Psychology Professors Assess Faculty Mentoring Program for American Psychological Association

An assessment study conducted by Dana S. Dunn and Stacey Zarembo of the Psychology Department was cited in a recent issue of the *APA Monitor*, the monthly newspaper published by the American Psychological Association. The *Monitor* article discusses mentoring programs for junior faculty in psychology across the country, and Dunn and Zarembo were interviewed for the article. The article highlights the trend in which junior faculty find support and career guidance from mentoring programs that pair them with senior faculty outside their own department—and sometimes on entirely different campuses.

The two Moravian College psychologists are currently writing an assessment report about APA's Division Two (Teaching of

Psychology) Mentoring Program for untenured junior faculty. The program matches junior faculty (mentees) with experienced senior colleagues (mentors) from similar institutions. So far, Dunn and Zarembo have found that most mentees are women in tenure-track positions who are seeking advice on issues ranging from teaching issues to career planning. Many of the respondents want to be connected with other minority professors in order to learn the skills necessary to succeed in academic psychology and academe more generally. Stacey and Dana will be presenting a version of their report at the annual meeting of the American Psychological Association in August 1999. Here on campus, the two researchers have been leading the Faculty Orientation program for junior colleagues since last September.

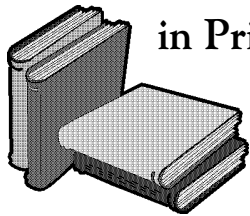
Application forms are available at the HUB desk or at the Alumni House. Completed applications must be submitted to the Alumni Office by April 20, 1999.

## Moravian People in Print



Robert Stinson's essay on Lincoln Steffens, turn-of-the-century journalist and urban critic who wrote *The Shame of the Cities* (1904), appears in a new reference work, *Encyclopedia of Urban America—The Cities and Suburbs* edited by Neil Shumsky and published this week by ABC-CLIO.

Morris Bader, chemistry professor emeritus, had a second article accepted by *American Laboratory* scheduled for publication in September. *American Laboratory* is an international technical journal which publishes articles on the most recent scientific equipment available, or occasionally on scientific theory. In effect, *American Laboratory* provides free advertising for the newest scientific advances.

Morris's article is entitled "MIDAS—A New Tool for the Numeric Solution of Coupled Linear or Non-Linear Ordinary Differential Equations." MIDAS, written in FORTRAN, now incorporates a number of new original devices for the solutions of these difficult equations.

He explained, "These new discoveries in theory and implementation now allow this program to tackle the most difficult problems, those that fall into the classification known as 'stiff.' At this time, MIDAS is probably the strongest Runge-Kutta program available anywhere, and is ready to challenge any other general

## Faculty Perform with Lehigh Valley Chamber Orchestra in Concert and Open Rehearsal

Moravian College faculty members Robin Kani (flute) and Larry Wright (trumpet) will be guest soloists with the Lehigh Valley Chamber Orchestra (LVCO) in a concert in Foy Hall on Saturday, April 10, at 8:00 p.m.

The chamber orchestra under conductor Donald Spieth will perform the world premier of *Orison (A Child's Prayer)*, a newly commissioned work by Steven Sametz, a member of the Lehigh University Music Department. The orchestra will also perform Handel's Concerto Grosso in F major, Fash's Trumpet Concerto in D major, Martin's Ballade for Flute, and Haydn's Symphony no. 88 in G major.

On Friday, April 9, at 7:45 p.m. LVCO will present an open rehearsal of the Saturday concert, also in Foy Hall. Doors will open at 7:30 p.m. Admission is free and no tickets are required. The open rehearsal is sponsored by the Bell Atlantic Foundation. For further information call the LVCO office at (610) 266-8555.

Robin Kani has been described by the *New York Times* as an artist with "professional aplomb as well

as technical authority . . . [who] played with complete assurance and accuracy." Robin made her debut at Carnegie Recital Hall after winning the Artists' International Chamber Music Award. Robin is principal flutist of the Bethlehem Bach Festival orchestra, the Lehigh Valley Chamber Orchestra, and the Pennsylvania Sinfonia Orchestra, and has appeared in performance throughout the eastern United States, Mexico, Germany, Spain, and the Czech Republic.

Larry, in addition to performing with the Lehigh Valley Chamber Orchestra, is principal trumpet of the Allentown Symphony, the Bethlehem Bach Festival Orchestra, the Pennsylvania Sinfonia Orchestra, and co-principal trumpet of Philadelphia Brass. He has performed with the Metropolitan Opera, the New Jersey Symphony, and the Festival of the Two Worlds in Spoleto, Italy.

## Moravian Student begins Coaches vs. Cancer for American Cancer Society Lehigh Valley Unit

*(The following article is a reprint from Horizon of Hope, the publication of the American Cancer Society, Lehigh Valley Unit, written by JoAnn M. Frey, executive director, about Moravian student Doug Kleintop.)*

Doug Kleintop, Lehigh Valley region chairperson for Coaches vs. Cancer, coordinated preseason meetings with area coaches, athletic directors, and staff in an attempt to receive commitments from all colleges and universities in the Lehigh Valley. He asked each school to participate in the IKON 3 Point Attack in which funds are raised by individuals pledging for 3-point shots made by the team throughout the season.

Kleintop's efforts were successful. Schools participating in the IKON 3 Point Attack are: Allentown College, Cedar Crest College, East Stroudsburg University, Kutztown University, Lehigh University, Moravian College, and Lafayette College. Muhlenberg College also participated by donating proceeds from one game at the Scotty Wood Tournament to Coaches vs. Cancer.

Doug Kleintop is a junior sports management major at Moravian. Last season, Moravian head coach Jim Walker contacted Kleintop about helping to raise money for his Coaches vs. Cancer program. Moravian College raised nearly \$1,000 with a one-night raffle. And now with the support of other area coaches, there looks to be great support for the IKON 3 Point Attack and Coaches vs. Cancer in the Lehigh Valley.

On October 20 a tip-off luncheon and press conference was held at Applebee's restaurant. Mimi Griffin, sports announcer for ESPN, was the honorary chairperson. WFMZ-TV-69 produced a 30-second radio public service announcement; and the local newspapers monitored the program weekly.

[At season's end, a total of nearly \$15,000 had been raised.]

A Director's Choice Award of \$500 was selected by Les Reker, director of Payne Gallery. It was presented to Wayne Kimball, Pleasant Grove, Utah, for "A Tree with One Wing Can Only Fly in Circles," (lithograph).

## Middle Atlantic Conference Lists 12 Students on All-Academic Teams and Honor Rolls

Twelve student-athletes from Moravian College are listed on the Middle Atlantic Conference All-Academic Teams and Honor Rolls that were released Wednesday. This year is the first for the MAC Executive Director's All-Academic Teams and the Academic Honor Rolls. In the past, all student-athletes were named to the MAC All-Academic Teams.

Moravian placed four student-athletes on the MAC Executive Director's All-Academic Teams while the other eight were named to the Academic Honor Roll.

To be eligible for All-Academic honors, a student-athlete must be at least a sophomore, maintain a 3.20 or higher grade point average and be a starter of significant reserve on a fall athletic team.

Seniors Jessie Coughlin and Matt Getter from the women's and men's basketball teams and juniors Erica Landes and Tim Pfluger of the women's and men's indoor track and field teams were named to the MAC Executive Director's All-Academic Team.

Coughlin led Moravian to its 19th straight winning season by averaging 12.6 points per game, 3.3 assists per contest and 2.9 steals per night. Coughlin, a member of the MAC Commonwealth League All-Star Second Team, completed her career with 1,137 points, 346 assists, 312

steals, and 166 three-pointers in 99 games.

Getter set the Moravian single season and career three-point field goal records this season. He connected on 71 treys this winter and made 140 three-pointers in his career. He was second on the Greyhound squad in scoring this season at 14.5 points per game. Getter also set a school record with nine three-pointers in a 36-point effort in a victory over Elizabethtown.

Landes placed third at the MAC Championships in the high jump, clearing a height of five feet. She cleared the same distance last winter for the MAC indoor title. Pfluger was the MAC champion in the 1,500 meters this season, and was also part of the MAC champion distance medley relay team.

Earning spots on the MAC Academic Honor Roll were senior Stephanie Rickards and junior Jen Polaha from the women's basketball team, juniors Jim O'Rourke and Rich Whalen of the men's basketball squad, sophomores Brooke Dancho and Leah Williams from the women's indoor track and field team and senior Chris Lowthert and sophomore Damon Rutherford of the men's indoor track and field team.
