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Automatic E-Mail Cleanup Starts on April 6

Over the past few months, a growing problem has hindered the effectiveness of e-mail here at the College and Seminary. "The problem is quite simple," says Ron Helmuth, director of the Center for Information Technology. "A significant number of our users simply do not properly maintain and clean their electronic mailboxes. As a result, at any one time, the mailboxes of 400 to 500 users are full and therefore disabled. This means that if you need to send out a general communication to the entire College, twenty percent of the community will not receive it."

At 4:00 a.m., on Friday, April 6, CIT will enable a feature on Microsoft Exchange that will access all faculty and staff members' deleted items, sent items, and inbox e-mail folders and will automatically clean and delete all three folders based on the age of the message. Once this is done, those message will be unrecoverable. "If messages are more than eight days old in your deleted items folder, more than

Faculty/Administrative Staff Activities

Scot Dapp, professor of physical education and head football coach, had an article published in *Extra Point*, the official news publication of the American Football Coaches Association. The article, "Practice Rules are Working Against Division III Players," dealt with issues concerning NCAA rules that prohibit football coaches from working with their players in the off season. Scot was also a guest lecturer at the convention of the Pennsylvania State Football Coaches Association, held in Hershey, and spoke at the Susquehanna Valley Coaches Clinic held in Lancaster.

Otto Dreydoppel, director of Moravian studies and assistant professor of church history at the Seminary, was one of three respondents to the 2001 Torbet Memorial Lecture at Eastern Baptist Theological Seminary.

The principal lecturer was Cardinal Anthony Bevilacqua, archbishop of Philadelphia. His topic was "Understanding *Dominus Iesus*: Reflections on the Catholic-Protestant Dialogue." *Dominus Iesus* is a declaration issued by the Vatican to

clarify certain matters of Catholic doctrine which may have been misunderstood by Protestants. Cardinal Bevilacqua stated that *Dominus Iesus* says nothing new or different from traditional Catholic teaching and that speaking honestly about Catholic doctrine is the best way for the Church to relate to other religions and denominations. In response, Otto said that Protestants can agree with many of the statements in *Dominus Iesus* regarding the person of Jesus Christ and the call to missionary outreach, but that Catholic and Protestant understandings of the nature of the Church continue to be a point of disagreement.

Corinne Lalin, adjunct faculty member of the Art Department, will have her work featured in an invitational exhibition entitled "Shown in Philadelphia: Not Yet Known in New York," at the Krasdale Foods Gallery in White Plains, New York. The opening reception is on Thursday, April 12, at 7:30 p.m. Accompanying the show is a 40-page color catalog featuring one of Corinne's paintings on the cover. The show will be reviewed by the *New York Times*.

Monday Roundtable to Feature Rudy Ackerman



The final Monday Roundtable lecture for the spring 2001 season, sponsored by the Moravian College Alumni Association, will take place on April 9, with a presentation on Italian works of art by Rudy Ackerman, Priscilla Payne Hurd Professor of Arts and Humanities. The evening will begin with an optional cafeteria-style dinner at 6:15 p.m. (\$7.00 per person) in the United Brethren's Church Room of the HUB, followed by

the lecture in Prosser Auditorium at 7:00 p.m.

Rudy was the chair of the Art Department from 1963 to September 2000. Under his leadership, a relatively small department offering one art history class and studio workshops developed into a full art curriculum that offers majors in art history, graphic design, and, most recently, art education. Rudy's creative work in sculpture, painting, and printmaking has been exhibited both locally and internationally. Numerous commissions and awards for his work, as well as recognition for outstanding personal service to the community, distinguish his career. Most recently, he was awarded the Inez and Edward Donley Award for community services for children. He is the recipient of the Downtown Allentown Community Achievement Award on behalf of the Baum School of Art, and is listed in *Who's Who in American Art*.

In 1965, Rudy was appointed executive director of the Baum School of Art and the Circulating Picture Club. Over the years, a major program of art education was developed and currently serves over five hundred students per week. The Circulating Picture Club provides a rental/sale program of the works of local and regional artists to over twenty corporations and businesses.

Rudy's presentation, called "A View from Abroad," will review works of art from Florence, Santa Croce, Rome, and Venice. He will speak on the Coliseum, the Sistine Chapel, St. Peter's Basilica, and the art treasures of the Vatican. For more information on this event contact the Alumni Office at extension 1366.

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32 days old in your sent items folder, or more than 93 days old in your inbox, those messages will be automatically deleted from the system," says Ron. "These deletions will be scheduled automatically, and will be done nightly. There will be no recovery of deleted messages. Student e-mail accounts will be cleaned on an even more rigorous schedule of 8-8-32. This action is necessary to restore the effectiveness of this official communications at Moravian, and will result in fewer than two percent of mailboxes being disabled at any time."

If you need to save a message from one of these three folders for longer than the time allotted, you may establish a folder and store messages on the Y drive in that folder. On Thursday, March 29, an instructional page will be set up on the Moravian College intranet that will give users step-by-step instructions on how to create this folder and how to store messages in it. CIT will also hold an instructional presentation on March 29 at 2:00 p.m. in Reeves 212 to demonstrate this process. "This event is *not open* to general attendance," says Ron. "We are requesting that each department send one contact person to this presentation. This person will be instructed in the process, and will then be that department's support person to help the other members clean and organize their mailboxes."

C.I.T has designated Tuesday, April 3, as "Clean Up E-mail Day." "We are asking all individuals to allot time on this day to clean and organize their e-mail before the new policy takes effect
