Stan Roman Leadership Series a Success

The Stan Roman Leadership Series, created and endowed by Stan Roman, former member of the Board of Trustees, has been a success since its inception last semester. The series was developed due to Stan's interest in bringing regional and community leaders to Moravian to talk with a select group of students about critical aspects of leadership. It was also derived from a need to provide students with the opportunity to recognize, develop, and practice effective leadership. Past speakers were Don Cunningham, mayor of the City of Bethlehem; Fred Rooney '75, a local attorney; Brigadier General Malham Wakin, professor emeritus of philosophy at the U.S. Air Force Academy; and Roger Onorati, a leadership/management consultant.

The program takes place each month. Invited presenters share their thoughts and perspectives on leadership either in an intimate setting of 15-20 specially selected students, or in a larger venue of 40-50 students. Students that participate in these

Three Fulbright Scholars in Three Years

Courtney Rice '01, a double major in German and education, has become the third Moravian student in a row, and the third German major in a row, to be awarded a Fulbright Fellowship to teach and study in Germany. Daniel Byrne, a German and history graduate from the class of '00, is presently serving as a "pädagogischer assistent" teaching history at a high school that prepares students for university studies. Concurrently, Daniel is continuing the research he began in the Honors Program on postwar author Heinrich Böll. Marianne Zwicker, a German graduate of the class of '99, has completed a year of research in Berlin on the status of Germany's Gypsies following the Holocaust. She is planning to return to Germany to teach this year.

"Courtney has been an exceptional student since she came to Moravian College nearly four years ago," say Hans Wuerth, professor of German. "In addition to an excellent academic record, she has given much of her time to organizing numerous campus-wide activities." During the second half of her junior year, Courtney spent six months abroad, mostly at the University of Tübingen (Moravian

Faculty/Administrative Staff Activities

Bob Brill, associate professor of psychology, Amy Baehr, assistant professor of philosophy and chair of the Department of Philosophy, and John Reynolds, professor of political science and chair of the Department of Political Science, attended the National Center of Postsecondary Teaching, Learning, and Assessment Institute, March 29-31, in Cincinnati. The workshop was conducted by the Center for the Study of Higher Education and sponsored by ACT and Penn State University. The workshop provided participating teams with a framework and resources to assist their colleges in their assessment efforts.

Bonnie Falla, reference and public services librarian, and **Dorothy Glew**, reference and public service librarian, attended the biennial conference of the Association of College and Research Libraries, March 15-18, in Denver. Among the presentations they attended were several on using technology to improve library functions and enhance teaching, applying the new ACRL Standards for Information Literacy to library instruction, digital reference services, and the initiatives being undertaken in response to inflation in journal pricing. Eileen de los Reyes, assistant professor of education from Howard University, presented a paper entitled "Becoming Pockets of Hope: The Challenge to Academic Libraries of the 21st Century."

Linda LaPointe, reference and public services librarian, and **Tom Minor**, director of Reeves Library, attended the winter meeting of the Southeastern Pennsylvania Theological Library Association in Lansdale, February 20.

Jim Mitchell, professor of biology, has been invited to participate in a ten-day interdisciplinary seminar at the University of Wollongong in Australia. Topics for this seminar will include the multicultural nature of contemporary Australian society and relations with its indigenous people, human occupation and environmental challenges, pharmacognosy, and current issues in Southeast Asia. In addition, Jim has continued his work as a college textbook reviewer for W.C. Brown-McGraw Hill. His most recent review concerned the 6th edition of *Human Anatomy* by Keith Van Der Graff.

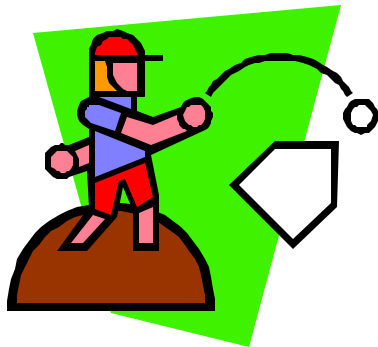

Moravian Softball Ranked Nationally

For the first time in school history, the Moravian College softball team has earned national ranking. In this season's first National Softball Coaches Association NCAA Division III Top 25 poll, released on Wednesday, April 4, the Greyhounds are ranked nineteenth. Moravian, which currently has a 19-7 overall record and a 4-2 slate in the Commonwealth Conference, had received votes in the pre-season poll as well, but the team has never been ranked in the top 25.

The Greyhounds have played three other ranked teams this season, defeating third-ranked Pacific Lutheran University, and losing to seventh-ranked Cabrini College and twenty-first-ranked University of La Verne. Moravian will finish its 2001 regular season with a doubleheader against twelfth-ranked William Paterson University on Thursday, April 26.

Most recently, the Mississippi-based rock band took home the American Music Award for Favorite New Artist in the Pop/Rock category, and earned a Grammy Award nomination for Best Rock Song with *Kryptonite*. New International Study Opportunities Available

The Office of International Studies announces two new undergraduate student exchange partnerships established this semester. Moravian students now have the opportunity to study at the University of Buckingham in Buckingham, England, or at the University of Southern Queensland in Toowoomba, Australia.

The University of Buckingham works on a quarter system, and the academic year runs from January through December. The University of Southern Queensland works on a semester system, but the academic year runs February through November, during the Australian fall and spring.

Students participating in this venture would pay their tuition directly to Moravian College. Room and board fees would be paid directly to the host school. Since this is an exchange program, any financial aid that the participating student normally receives to study at Moravian would still apply, including Moravian scholarships. Students are responsible for travel and personal expenses.

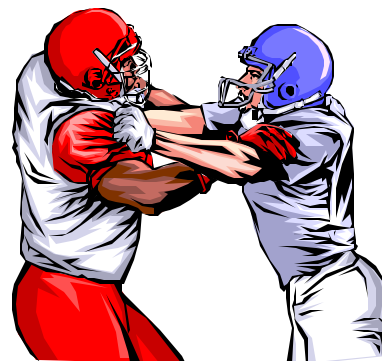

Moravian Football Players Participate in the All-Stars Game

Moravian College offensive lineman Adam Smith '01 and running back P. J. Jankowicz '01 competed in the National All-Stars and Professional Football Association All-Star games at Alumni Stadium in Perry, Ohio, on Saturday, March 31. Adam and P. J. reported to the location on Friday, March 30 for a morning Pro Football combine, two practice sessions, and an award banquet. Game day followed, with a morning practice session and two games at 3:00 p.m. and 7:00 p.m.

Adam and P. J. helped the football team to a 6-4 record last season, and led an offense that averaged 25.5 points and 352.5 yards per game, including 121.1 yards per game on the ground.

P. J. ran for 264 yards and three touchdowns on 86 carries last fall after switching from tailback to fullback. He completed his career as the seventh player in College history to rush for over 2,000 yards, finishing his career with 2,123 yards in four seasons.



Amnesty International Concert a Success

Debra Torok, applied music teacher, performed "Keys for Hope," a 40th anniversary benefit concert for Amnesty International on Sunday, March 18. Renowned Chinese human rights activist Dr. Harry Wu shared the stage to give a pre-concert talk entitled "Behind the Great Wall."

"Keys for Hope," is a narrated musical tribute to human rights featuring short piano works by international contemporary composers, and represents an artistic response to human rights injustices and environmental issues. Debra dedicated each piece to a different human rights activist.

Dr. Wu's presentation, "Behind the Great Wall," discussed his human rights experiences in China before coming to the United States in 1979. He was arrested in 1960 for speaking out against the Soviet invasion of Hungary and for criticisms of the Chinese Community Party. He spent 19 years in twelve labor camps before coming to the United States. He was arrested again in the mid-1990's while visiting China for research. He was released after an international outcry led by Amnesty International and many others. Wu is executive director of the Laogai Research Foundation, a non-profit organization which documents abuses within Chinese slave labor camps.

The concert was sponsored by Moravian College as part of its 300-year anniversary celebration of the invention of the piano,

with assistance from local Amnesty International groups. The event brought in \$2,560.00.

Amnesty International, founded in London in 1961, is a grassroots activist organization dedicated to freeing prisoners of conscience, gaining fair trials for political prisoners, ending torture, political killings and "disappearances," and abolishing the death penalty throughout the world.

TEAM Program Extends Thanks

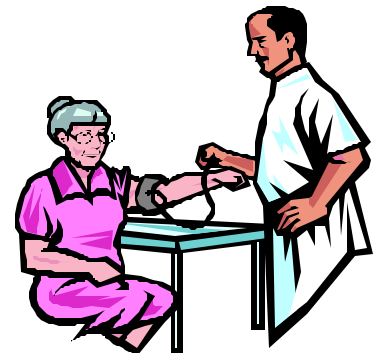

Test participants will be placed on the National Bone Marrow Registry in hopes that future matches can be found for those in need of a bone marrow transplant. The testing procedure is simple and brief. It includes a short screening process and sampling of a small amount of blood. The blood is then tested and the bone marrow type of each participant is placed on the National Registry. Participation in the test does not require or legally bind anyone to complete the donation process should a match be found.

This bone marrow drive is in support of a fraternity member's mother who suffers from a disease that can only be treated with a bone marrow transplant. currently has two more German majors studying there). While in Germany, Courtney spent several days in Herrnhut to conduct research on the educational system of the Moravian Church during the 18th and 19th centuries.

Courtney will be informed in May about the exact location of the school where she will be a teaching assistant from September until the end of May 2002. "Based on a list of last year's Fulbright winners, the students of Moravian College were in competition with outstanding students from across the United States," said Hans. "Most of the Fulbright Grant winners have graduated from some of the best colleges and universities in the United States."
