The last day of classes for the College were on May 1. The concluding events of the College year begin with a final faculty meeting on Thursday, May 13, at 1:30 p.m. and end with Commencement on Saturday, May 15, at 10:00 a.m. The ceremony will be held in the HUB Quadrangle.

There are approximately 306 bachelor's degree candidates and 24 M.B.A. candidates. Honorary doctorates will be awarded to Charles J. Peischl, chair of the Moravian College Board of Trustees, and to H. A. Wagner, chairman of the board and president and CEO of Air Products, Inc. Both will receive the degree of Doctor of Law.

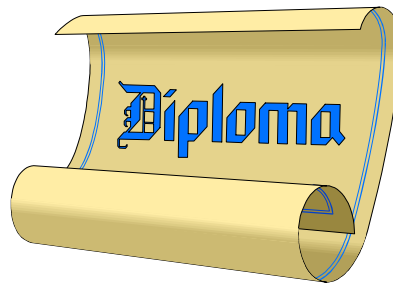
Fifteen students are scheduled to receive degrees from the Seminary. Two students are scheduled to receive certificates.

The graduate address will be given by Margaret Wellert Braden '99 who was elected by the graduating class.

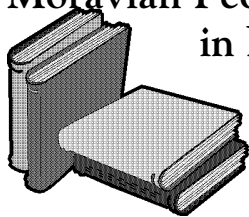

Reeves Library Receives Grant

Reeves Library recently received a grant from the Reeves Foundation of Dover, Ohio, for \$59,000 worth of movable shelving for the bound periodicals section. The Reeves Foundation has provided support for the library since it was built in 1967.

The library serves 2,200 students and nearly 300 faculty and staff members as well as the local community and visiting scholars. Holdings include 244,900 books and additional non-book materials, items in the Moravian Collection, music items (including scores) and microforms. The installation of movable shelving will increase the capacity for bound periodicals by approximately 25%.

Activities

Three members of the Psychology Department made presentations at the the Eastern Psychological Association held in Providence, Rhode Island, in April. . . Bob Brill delivered two poster presentations which he co-authored with two recent graduates at the conference. Both studies were developed from Honors projects conducted by Christine Cervelli '97 and David Nocek '98, who are pursuing their master's degrees at Rutgers University and Villanova University respectively. Christine attended the conference and represented her work "Attitude Change Regarding AIDS and Alcoholism through Film Viewing." Dave's study, "Goal Setting Interventions: How Elaborate Does It Need to Be?" was presented within the same poster session focusing on attitude change and social cognition.

Lori Toedter and senior psychology major Michael Harrison presented a poster based on work completed last summer as a result of Mike's participation in the SOAR program. The poster entitled "Effects of Carotid Artery Stenosis on Memory Function," was based on memory data collected from patients in the office of a local vascular surgery practice.

Stacey Zaremba presented a poster entitled "Feminist Pedagogy: A Model for the Psychology of Women Course." This poster described several of the components of Stacey's Psychology of Women class that are consistent with the key elements of feminist pedagogy.

Dana Dunn presented two posters which were co-authored by recent graduates (Carolyn

Vicchiullo '96 and Brett Stoudt '98. The first poster, entitled "Social Inhibition among Persons with HIV/AIDS: A Pilot Study," studied psychosocial well-being in AIDS patients. The second poster, entitled "Social Support Among Persons with HIV/AIDS: Preliminary Observations," examined the relationship between social support and health symptoms, depression, and life-satisfaction in AIDS patients.

Six campus members attended an Outcomes Assessment Workshop . . . On Friday, April 9, six representatives from Moravian College attended an Outcomes Assessment Workshop at East Stroudsburg University. Jim Barnes (Music Department), Linda Kvamme (Division of Continuing Studies), Karen Keim and Martha Reid (English Department), Carol Moeller (Philosophy Department), and Bob Brill (Psychology Department) attended several sessions on assessment processes or strategies to be conducted at the course, departmental, and/or general education level. Other sessions focused on assessment issues for special programs, such as students with disabilities. The workshop culminated with a presentation, discussion, and shared assessment instrument on faculty vitality and well-being.

Community and Diversity Task Force Develops Action-Oriented Game Plan

This article on the Community and Diversity Task Force is the sixth and final article in a series on the task forces of the Moravian College and Moravian Theological Seminary Commission on the Future. The Commission has been working throughout the year to review the institution's mission and goals and to strategize their achievement. The Community and Diversity Task Force headed by Odell Guyton has been charged to develop an action-oriented game plan for making the College and Seminary the inclusive community required to prepare graduates adequately for the diverse world they will face.

Odell is a 1977 graduate of Moravian, majoring in criminal justice and business administration. He graduated from American University, Washington College of Law in 1981. He served as a member of the Moravian College Board of Trustees from October 1994 to 1998 as an alumni representative. He was elected to serve a second term on the board in 1998. He has served as the chair of the Trustee Academic Program Committee, as a member of the Academic Dean Search Committee, as a trustee on the Student Affairs and Enrollment Committee, as a member of the Joint Board Executive Committee of the College and Seminary, and as a member of the St. Luke's Governing Board for the School of Nursing. Odell is the corporate compliance officer at the University of Pennsylvania.

He believes the Commission is the perfect vehicle for Moravian College to position itself for the challenges of the next century. He said, "The Commission, through its six task forces, is providing Moravian with a vehicle to re-

connect with its community and its history and traditions. The Community and Diversity Task Force includes alumni (representing many graduating classes and multiple ethnicity), community and business leaders, parents of both former and current students, faculty, administration, and friends of the college."

Task Force Tenet

The task force, in working toward outlining what was essential to a sense of community and diversity on campus, accepted the premise that civility and diversity must go hand in hand. The members were also charged with examining how the community could model the qualities of civility and mutual respect that seem to be endangered in social and political life, while celebrating and sustaining the differences among the members of that community.

Odell expressed his hopes on what the task force will accomplish. "It is my hope that the task force recommendations will help spur meaningful change in the recruitment and retention of under-represented groups, improvements to the curriculum, and improvements in our recruitment of under-represented faculty and administrators. There are signs that we are making some progress to achieving these goals as well."

He added, "I recently read a message from President Rokke to

the Moravian College campus community on March 30, on the issue of intolerance and incivility. A part of the message read as follows:

"In a community of scholars that must accommodate and explore a wealth of divergent views and ideas, our acceptance—indeed, our embrace—of individual differences and diversity is the very tie that binds us in our common purpose."

Odell stressed the importance of the College's efforts to improve diversity at Moravian, saying they are more than highlighted by the recent events in Littleton, Colorado, and the present war in Kosovo. "In order to truly meet the challenges of the next millennium and to prepare our students to become successful world leaders, we must instill in our graduates a tenet of the task force, 'to have a profound respect for the fundamental dignity and value of individual human beings.'"

M³ = Mathematics Matters at Moravian

More than 50 participants attended M³ = Mathematics Matters at Moravian, a conference for high school students on April 15. The students attended sessions on discovery with Sketch Pad, statistics, and graphics on the calculator. A special morning highlight was a presentation by Doris Schattschneider of the Mathematics Department on tiling.

Other Moravian mathematics professors who participated were Kay Somers, Thomas Linton, Fred Schutheis, Mohamed Bugaighis, and Alicia Sevilla.

Mary Faith Carson Honored for 24 Years of Theology, Literature, and Coffee

Mary Faith Carson of the Religion Department was honored on April 22 for serving 24 years as moderator for Theology, Literature, and Coffee (TLC). The last session of the Seminary's 1999 TLC program was transformed into a surprise luncheon which brought together 45 TLC participants, Seminary deans, and many of the presenters that Mary Faith had recruited throughout the years.

Mary Faith's commitment, spirited leadership, and good humor was lauded by both presenters and participants as TLC memories and behind-the-scene incidents were recounted. She was given a gift certificate to the Moravian Book Shop as a retirement gift, as she will be stepping out of the roll of moderator at the end of this session. Her commitment to the program was underscored when she told the group, "I look forward to sitting among you from this point on!"

The first session of Theology, Literature, and Coffee was held in the spring of 1976 at the Seminary. It was one of the first programs sponsored by the Lay Academy of the Lehigh Valley, an ecumenical organization committed to providing adult education for lay people.

Mary Faith was a member of the steering committee of the Lay Academy and offered to organize and moderate a five-session "book club with theological themes." She recruited five presenters, and each

was asked to select a literary work, which would be discussed during a two-hour session.

Commitment and longevity have been the hallmark of TLC. Not only has Mary Faith been the sole moderator during its 24-year history, but four of the presenters have also served since 1976. Among the original presenters are Robert Burcaw, professor emeritus of English, Carole Brown, chair of the English Department, Mrs. Eloise Bassett Miller, retired English teacher, and Dr. Addison Bross, professor of English at Lehigh University. The original fifth presenter was Rev. Dr. Hugh Flesher, Lehigh University chaplain, who participated for fifteen years. Since 1991, the fifth presentation has been given by Jim Yerkes of the Religion Department, Ronald Rankin, a Liberty High School teacher, and Rev. Donald Nowers, visitation pastor at Asbury United Methodist Church.

A book list of the 120 titles discussed since 1976 was compiled by the Office of Continuing Education in honor of Mary Faith. The titles include literary masterpieces such as Dante's *Inferno*, the

Canterbury Tales, and *Huckleberry Finn*. Other selections span a broad range of style and themes: *The Color Purple*, *The Communist Manifesto*, *The Plague*, *Snow Falling on Cedars*, the *Satanic Verses*, and *The Little Prince*. The complete book list is available from the Office of Continuing Education at the Seminary, ext. 1519 (Jane Burcaw).

"On behalf of the Seminary, and the many lives that were enriched by the presentations of Theology, Literature and Coffee, we say thank you to Mary Faith for her 24 years of commitment and spirited leadership," said Jane.

Have Any Old Comenians or Belfrys?

Melanie Fiske, Reeves Library serials librarian, and Dan Gilbert, college archivist, are looking for missing issues of two publications. Reeves Library holds issues of the *Comenian* from the first issue published in 1891. However, there are gaps in the collection that need to be filled for archival purposes. Needed are issues between v.38:no.8 (1929) through v. 44 (1937). Also, issues between v.47:no.22 (1947) through v.49 and v.50:no.15 (1947) through v. 51.

In addition issues of the *Belfry* are being sought. This was a bi-monthly literary magazine with contributions by students and an annual alumni issue. The library holds some copies from 1929 - 1931 and is interested in expanding its holdings as well as tracing a history of this publication.
