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Alumni Leadership Weekend Celebrates Achievements, Informs Participants

An awards ceremony, reception, and concert on Friday, September 15, kicked off Alumni Leadership Weekend 2000. Eighty people attended the dinner reception and almost 100 people attended the alumni awards ceremony in Peter Hall. Alumni Board president Candy Barr Heimbach '79 honored volunteers who have provided exceptional service to Moravian. Award recipients included Frank Chou '96, who received the Emerging Leader Award; Don Beck '71, the Unsung Hero Award; Jackie Karpow '96, the Event Volunteer of the Year Award; and Rebecca Kleintop Owens '95, the Young Alumni Achievement Award. Gina Stano '99 also accepted an award on behalf of the Class of 1999 for the highest giving participation rate in a young alumni class.

Gus Rampone '59 then recognized last year's reunion classes. The award for Outstanding Reunion Chair went to Mary Mudri Foglia '50. The Class of 1950 Men, represented by Justin Carisio '50 and Bob Scholl '50, won an award for most class spirit and also tied with the Class of

1950 Women for the highest percentage of reunion attendance. The Class of 1945 Women secured three awards: for the largest reunion class gift total, the largest matching gift total, and the highest participation rate for a reunion gift. Jackie Haas Bauder '45 and Janet Moyer Paulus '45 accepted these awards on behalf of their class. The award for the most creativity went to the Class of

1975, represented by Bob Gratz '75 and Cindy Lewis Hart '75. The award recipients' names were inscribed on silver presentation bowls which are displayed in the Hauptert Union Building throughout the year. After the awards ceremony, more than 300 people attended Rebecca Kleintop Owens' organ concert in Foy Hall. Rebecca '95 is recipient of the first young alumni achievement award.

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Seminary Receives Grant from the Carpenter Foundation

Moravian Theological Seminary has been awarded a grant of \$47,770 from the E. Rhodes and Leona B. Carpenter Foundation. The grant will provide full-tuition scholarships for five international students selected

as *Moravian Unity Scholars*. The scholarship program, which serves to bring together future Church leaders, provides tuition grants to candidates from provinces of the Moravian Church beyond the continental United States and Canada. The first three Seminary students to receive scholarships funded through the Carpenter Foundation grant are Rosieta Burton of Great Britain, Erdmute Enkelmann of Germany, and Tuntufye Mwenisongole of Tanzania.

The E. Rhodes and Leona B. Carpenter Foundation, based in Philadelphia, supports museums, healthcare, and graduate theological education on a national basis.
