## College Adopts New Policy on Supplying Computers to Employees

Moravian College has created and put into place a new policy on supplying computers to employees. The College supplies a Macintosh or Windows desktop computer to full-time employees who utilize one to fulfill their duties. Part-time employees or adjunct faculty are provided computers depending on their needs and available funds. With the appropriate approvals, employees requiring a laptop because of work or travel requirements are accommodated as funds allow. All Moravian computer requests and acquisitions are handled by the Center for Information Technology. CIT maintains a 4-year refresh cycle for each primary computer provided to employees. Because of significantly higher costs of laptop computers versus desktop computers, the appropriate division vice president or dean must approve the granting of laptop computers to employees. The Reeves Library Reference Desk maintains a number of PC and Mac laptops available for short-term loan.

Because of preference or need, an employee may set up and use

the provided Moravian-owned desktop or laptop computer off-campus rather than in the employee's campus office. When doing so, the employee needs to notify CIT when relocating a Moravian-owned desktop computer off-campus. No notification is needed for laptop computers since CIT expects that those will be used on- and off-campus. The off-campus computer is still considered property of the College and is to be used exclusively for Moravian-related activities. The employee will be

responsible for any tax implications related to non-Moravian use of College owned-equipment. On-campus Moravian computer data kept on shared network drives is backed up daily. Off-campus users must either transfer their data to the Moravian network from time to time for backup, or do their own backup onto removable media. Sensitive and confidential data is to be secured from unauthorized access.

## Paul Acampora Named Director of Annual Funds



Paul Acampora has been chosen as the new director of annual funds for Moravian College and Theological Seminary. Paul has been a member of Moravian's development office as associate director of annual funds since November 1999, and has been responsible for the establishment of the President's Circle of Excellence, consisting of donors of \$5,000 and over to the annual fund, and for a 44 percent increase in fiscal year 1999-2000 in gifts from business and industry. He will assume his new duties effective January 1.

In promoting Paul to this position, Susanne Shaw, vice president for institutional advancement, cited Paul's excellent fundraising and staff management skills, and experience in development work. "We are delighted that Paul has accepted this position and we are confi-

Although Moravian will provide virus protection software for an off-campus computer, the software must be implemented and updated by the user. Off-campus users should take reasonable and prudent steps to protect the hardware against theft, power surges, and lightning strikes. Employees taking Moravian computers off-campus must bear the risk and pay any deductible (\$250.00 as of September 2000). If a Moravian off-campus computer breaks down, the user is responsible for returning the computer to CIT for repair. If the user experiences off-campus configuration errors trying to connect via an off-campus Internet Service Provider, the user should contact the ISP. If the user experiences configuration errors trying to connect directly to the campus network and the Help Desk is unable to resolve the issue, the user is responsible for bringing the computer to CIT for configuration.

From time to time because of special projects, special needs, or funding arrangements, a second Moravian-owned computer may be supplied to an employee. In such cases the appropriate division vice president or dean

must approve the granting of a second computer to the employee. Second computers are not included in the 4-year primary computer refresh cycle without approval by the division vice president or dean. Second computer refresh requests will be added to the other first-time computer requests for the given year as funds allow.

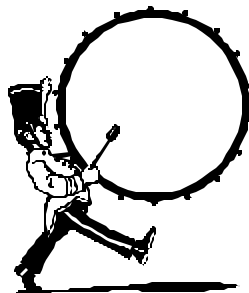

## Faculty/Staff Activities

**Clarke Chapman**, professor of religion, attended the annual national meeting of the American Academy of Religion, November 18-21, in Nashville. A plenary address was given by Elaine Barker of the London School of Economics on the sociology of religion and the study of new religious movements. Clarke attended sessions on millennialist sects in Africa, St. Paul's references to Roman imperial power, Dietrich Bonhoeffer's ethics, and the doctrine of providence in modern theology, and heard a guest lecture by famed Southern preacher and civil rights activist Will Campbell.

**Susan DeSanto-Madeya**, member of the nursing faculty and advisor of the Moravian College Student Nurses Association chapter of the Student Nurses Association of Pennsylvania (SNAP), along with the student officers of the club, was recognized at the November state convention in Reading for the best sustained chapter membership among SNAP.

**Curt Keim**, vice president for academic affairs and dean of the faculty and professor of history and political science, and **Karen Keim**, member of the adjunct faculty in English, attended a roundtable chaired by Margaret Jean Hay of Boston University at

the African Studies Association meeting in Nashville in November. Hay and participants explored the usefulness of novels for teaching African history. One of the challenges that emerged was the difficulty of presenting Africa through literature to students who have had no previous experience with the continent. In both African history and literature courses, professors have to teach awareness of the writer as creator, to counteract the tendency of students to read the literature as a representation of reality.

**Frank Kuserk**, professor of biology and chair of the Department of Biology, has been appointed to the advisory board of the Historic Delaware Canal Improvement Corporation. The HDCIC, along with the Pennsylvania Department of Conservation and Natural Resources, seeks to help realize the full potential of the Delaware Canal State Park through assisting and coordinating the efforts of groups dedicated to providing quality opportunities for studying natural science and history, providing recreational opportunities, and advancing economic development. Frank is joining environmental educators from Lehigh University, Lafayette College, Allentown College, Delaware Valley College, the College of New Jersey, and Bucks County Community College, along with other business, educational, and civic leaders on this board.

**Linda Kvamme**, assistant dean of Continuing and Graduate Studies, and the Continuing and Graduate Studies Council manned telephone lines during the recent pledge drive for
