You learn how to respectfully speak to, have conversations with, and become friends for life with people whom you have little in common with - even people which English is their 2nd or 3rd language! If you take small trips during your time abroad, you will become confident in your abilities to live on your own and be independent - more than you could ever imagine. There are many times when I have traveled on my own or with friends and we had to figure out how public transportation works or had to figure out what foods were on a menu all in a new language. By conquering these small challenges of living abroad, making connections, communicating, and traveling, you will feel like you can take on the world (literally).

AWARENESS - When you live abroad, there will certainly be some level of culture shock. By embracing and being fascinated with the differences rather than letting yourself feel overwhelmed by them, your perspective and experience completely shift.
