All About Student Visas

If you are studying abroad for a semester, the most important step is obtaining a visa. A visa is an official endorsement from the country of stay to allow you to legally stay there for more than 90 days. The difference between a visa and a passport is that passports serve identification purposes, while visas authorize your stay. Students studying abroad from the United States to another country will generally have to apply for a student visa to ensure they can study for the whole duration of the semester, which will generally be more than 90 days.

The requirements for applying for a visa vary by country. Some countries require you to go to the closest embassy to apply an interview in person, which is typically in a major city such as New York City, Philadelphia, or Washington, D.C to turn in your application materials. Be sure to be prepared and well-informed for these interview questions.

Generally, every country warns processing may take up to three months, so gathering all necessary materials for the application happen as soon as you begin applying for study abroad programs at Moravian College.

In my experience, I had to gather 10 different required documents to apply for a student visa in the Czech Republic. Some of these required documents take time themselves to gather, such as a notarized bank statement, criminal history background check, travel medical insurance, and proof of accommodation from the exchange university. Some visa applications require an application fee, so be sure to make that payment.

To some, visas and their application process may sound intimidating, but as long as you are organized and keep on top of things in a timely manner, you will be fine!
