This ceremony celebrates the diversity and inclusion of all cultures, backgrounds, and creeds. We celebrate our graduates today who have exceptional academic, social, and personal achievements. Through the ups and downs of their journey, they remain undefeated in the pursuit of success.

A stole is a scarf-like accessory worn draped around the neck. It can represent academic achievement, organizational affiliation, and even cultural significance. This is a personal touch on the traditional regalia worn during a commencement ceremony. Traditionally, many Black graduates will wear a Kente cloth stole representing heritage, culture, and ancestral lineage in relation to the African traditions of royalty. The colors and shapes of the Kente cloth all have symbolic meanings. Today our graduates will each receive the Perseverance Kente Stole which symbolizes achievement, honor, and overcoming many obstacles.

Graduates, these stoles should be worn with pride and enthusiasm as they represent the culmination of your dedication, perseverance, and an unrelenting desire to succeed. I wish you all positivity, love, and enlightenment in your future. This is only the beginning.

We will now move on to the main feature of this program, the graduates and their support networks. On the screen, you will see the individual name of the graduating senior followed by a tribute video that they recorded to thank their friends, family, and support system, also known as their village. 
