

Watching your student prepare for college is exciting—but it can also feel overwhelming. Here's how you can guide them through the process while empowering them to take the lead.

### STEP 1

### Foster Independence

- **Teach essential life skills:** Budgeting, time management, laundry, and basic cooking go a long way!
- **Encourage problem solving:** Remind them to reach out for academic or emotional support when needed.

#### STEP 2

## **Start the Conversation Early**

- **Set the Stage:** Begin talking about college as early as freshman year of high school.
- Explore interests: Ask about their passions, career aspirations, and how college fits into their future.
- Check in: What are they excited about? What worries them? Keep the dialogue open.

#### STEP 3

# **Help Research Colleges**

- **Create a list:** Help your student identify schools that align with their academic interests, location preferences, and extracurricular passions.
- **Plan campus visits:** Touring schools in person or virtually can help them get a feel for the right fit.
- Explore programs: Look into specific programs or majors and assess their strengths and reputation at different schools.

#### STEP 4

# **Understand Admission Requirements**

- Know the basics: Research GPA expectations and whether SAT/ACT scores are required or optional.
- **Encourage involvement:** Extracurricular activities, leadership roles, and volunteer work help strengthen applications.
- Think about recommendations: Help them identify teachers or mentors who could write strong letters of recommendation. Colleges typically look for 1-3 letters of recommendation.

#### STEP 5

# **Support Their Essays and Test Prep**

- Highlight the importance of essays: College essays showcase their personality, growth, and resilience—encourage authenticity! (Moravian doesn't require an essay, but we enjoy reading them—so we encourage you to submit one!)
- Prepare for tests: Research SAT/ACT dates and help them create a study plan or enroll in prep courses if needed. (Moravian doesn't require SAT/ACT scores.)
- **Discuss retakes:** If necessary, consider whether retaking a test could improve their application.

#### STEP 6

# **Keep Them on Track with Applications**

- Mark deadlines together: Track application, scholarship, and financial aid due dates.
- **Encourage early drafts:** Essays take time—encourage them to start early and get feedback from teachers or counselors.
- Prepare materials: Gather transcripts, recommendation letters, and other required documents ahead of deadlines to avoid last-minute stress.

### STEP 7

# **Talk Finances Early**

- Budget together: Discuss tuition, housing, travel, and other expenses.
- Explore financial aid: Research scholarships, grants, and federal student aid (FAFSA) options to maximize opportunities.
- **Plan ahead:** Set clear financial expectations and consider long-term savings strategies.

### **Guide Their Final Decision**

- **Discuss staying connected:** Set expectations for how you'll keep in touch while giving them space to grow.

- Acknowledge their hard work: Take time to celebrate
  this huge milestone with a special dinner, a small trip, or by
  simply telling them how proud you are.
- Stay involved (from a distance): If they choose Moravian, find ways to support them from home while letting them embrace their new chapter.
