THE CHRISTMAS VESPERS SERVICE

On behalf of our entire College and Seminary community, welcome to our Christmas Vespers service. The service unites two worship traditions in the Moravian Church: the *Singstunde* and the Candlelight Service. Since the 1720s, Moravians have been known for their worshipful singing, and a Moravian *Singstunde* (singing hour) is a service of music without preaching. In tonight's service, the music has been carefully selected and arranged to bring the Christmas message to listeners without the need of a sermon.

The Moravian candlelight service originated in 1747 in Marienborn, Germany, when candles with red trimming were distributed at the children's Christmas service. Bethlehem's first candle service was conducted in 1756. Our newest generation of Moravian students, the Class of 2014, aided by Gamma Sigma Sigma, hand-decorated all 6,000 Christmas Vespers candles during freshman orientation weekend in August. Some 290 friends of the College distribute these candles at the six Vespers services.

The beloved hymn "Morning Star," originally written for a child's voice and a chorus of children, was composed in 1836 by Francis Florentine Hagen, a member of the Moravian Theological Seminary Class of 1835. A version for soprano and mixed chorus was published by 1876. By long tradition, however, it is sung with a child soloist with responses from the mixed choir and congregation.

The offering taken at Christmas Vespers directly supports student financial aid at Moravian College.

CENTRAL MORAVIAN CHURCH

For five decades, Moravian College's Christmas Vespers has been held in Central Moravian Church, the worship center for Bethlehem's first religious congregation. Built between 1803 and 1806, a time when the population of Bethlehem was just 580 people, it was intended to accommodate a congregation of 1,500. Today its seating capacity is 1,100.

A striking feature of the neoclassical-style sanctuary is the absence of interior pillars to support the heavy roof and belfry. Instead these are held in place by massive foundation walls, with 68-foot-long white oak timbers resting on the side walls. From the belfry, the Bethlehem Area Moravian Trombone Choir, the oldest brass choir in continuous existence in America, announces the death of members of the congregation, as well as festivals of the church and community. The belfry houses the oldest American-made tower clock, built in Bethlehem in 1754. The bell was hung in 1868.

The Moravians brought an outstanding musical culture with them to America, and their settlements were among the most prestigious places to make music in the colonies. Haydn's oratorio *The Creation* was performed for the first time in America in Central Moravian Church in 1811, as was Bach's masterpiece, the Mass in B minor, in 1900. The Mass earned the church a designation as a National Landmark of Music. On December 18, 1998, USA Today named Central Moravian Church one of the nation's "Ten Great Places to Reflect on Christmas Eve."

The Moravian Church had its origin in the pre-Reformation awakening under John Hus. Formal organization under the name Unitas Fratrum (the Unity of the Brethren) was effected in 1457. Because much of its early history centered in Moravia (now part of the Czech Republic), the Unity is known informally as the Moravian Church. It is recognized as the oldest organized Protestant denomination in the world.

The permanent settlement of Bethlehem was named on Christmas Eve 1741.
